Sexual and Reproductive Health providers as human rights defenders

Gilmore K, Boydell V, International Planned Parenthood Federation, et al., 2022 study called for standing up for the human rights of SRHR providers and advocates and affirm that they are entitled to care for clients without harassment, intimidation, fear or threat as defenders of the rights. Providers in humanitarian settings also care against all odds and under increasing threats of being targeted and should be protected under human rights and international humanitarian law.

HIP Categories

HIP briefs are grouped into three primary categories:

Enabling Environment

Address systemic barriers that affect an individual's ability to access family planning information & services.

Service Delivery

Improve the availability, accessibility, acceptability, and quality of family planning services.

Social and Behavioral Change

Influence knowledge, beliefs, behaviors, and social norms associated with family planning.

Enhancements

Approaches used in conjunction with HIPs to maximize the impact of HIP implementation or increase the reach.







HIP Briefs

HIP briefs define the *practice* and summarize evidence of *impact* and experiential learning from implementing.

WHO

PREAMBLE TO THE CONSTITUTION

The STATES parties to this Constitution declare, in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations, that the following principles are basic to the happiness, harmonious relations and security of all peoples:

Health is a state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity.

The enjoyment of the highest attainable standard of health is one of the fundamental rights of every human being without distinction of race, religion, political belief, economic or social condition.

The health of all peoples is fundamental to the attainment of peace and security and is dependent upon the fullest cooperation of individuals and States.

The achievement of any State in the promotion and protection of health is of value to all.

Unequal development in different countries in the promotion of health and control of disease, especially communicable disease, is a common denote.

Healthy development of the child is of basic importance; the ability to live harmoniously in a changing total environment is essential to such development.

The extension to all peoples of the benefits of medical, psychological, and related knowledge is essential to the fullest attainment of health.

Informed opinion and active cooperation on the part of the public are of the utmost importance in the improvement of the health of the people.

Governments have a responsibility for the health of their peoples which can be fulfilled only by the provisions of adequate health and social measures.

ACCEPTING THESE PRINCIPLES, and for the purpose of cooperation among themselves and with others to promote and protect the health of all peoples, the contracting parties agree to the present Constitution and hereby establish the World Health Organization as a specialized agency within the terms of Article 57 of the Charter of the United Nations.

Ensuring Human Rights in Contraceptive Provision


PURPOSE: Provides guidance on actions that should be taken to ensure that human rights are systematically and clearly integrated into the provision of contraceptive information and services.

- Use to support advocacy efforts to provide the rights-based argument for expanding FP HIPs.
- Use in developing or updating training materials so that providers know how to reliably ensure the rights of their clients and potential clients in the provision of contraceptive services.

EXAMPLE: In conflict-affected settings women often face geographic barriers to accessing reproductive health care. WHO's Guideline on Ensuring Human Rights in Contraceptive Provision can be used to support rights-based advocacy for mobile outreach services in these settings.

Introduces a framework to help assess whether or not a country's family planning programme follows a human rights based approach (HRBA) to family planning.

Provides a definition of HRBA to family planning.

Assessing FP prograammes from a Human Rights Perspective

SPG supports an assessment of whether a country's service delivery meets HRBA criteria in key areas of family planning

- An examination of how well family planning programmes and their enabling environment adhere to international human rights standards and principles.
- by conducting assessments, stakeholders identify strengths, weaknesses, and gaps in their programs from a human rights perspective; identifying areas where improvements are needed to enhance the overall quality of family planning programs in promoting and protecting individuals' human rights.
- Provides an 8 step process for conducting an assessment, focusing on Step 4, the actual
 assessment. Emphasis placed on ensuring it is participatory and inclusive process

- Linked and aligned to existing HIP publications and other research that support this SPG.
- The SPG speaks to countries with different population dynamics both high and lower fertility contexts.
- The language of the SPG is aligned with human rights-based language and principles.
- Aims to be gender transformative
- In order to make the implementation of the SPG realistic, it clearly state that decision-makers do not need to tackle all of the recommendations at once but show entry points that can make a difference



- Promote Self-Care Interventions: Enhance awareness and availability of self-care interventions in FP, aligning with WHO guidelines e.g. DMPA SC
- Capacity building on agency and autonomy, particular emphasis HRBA principles in FP programming

Informed decisionmaking/ Informed choice

- Ensure IEC materials are available in formats such as braille, large print, and audio descriptions for persons with visual or print disabilities.
- Collaborate with sex worker-led organizations to develop culturally appropriate and non-judgmental SRHR IEC materials that address their specific needs and vulnerabilities.

What has been the outcome of applying an HRBA to FP in these different countries?

- ✓ Kenya: HRBA integrated into key national policy and programmatic documents (7th Edition of FP Guidelines; SCM Training packages; Nursing and Midwifery council curricula etc)
- ✓ Tanzania: HRBA enhanced advocacy for DRM leading to unlocking over USD4.4 Million Domestic Resources towards Contraceptive commodities for the Fiscal year 2024/2025.
- ✓ South Sudan: Opened Dialogue on HRBA to FP in Complex Humanitarian situation and developing national action plan
- ✓ Zambia, Mozambique, Uganda: Opened Dialogue on HRBA to FP amiong key partners and implementing Action plan



1. In-country capacity building and sensitization of key partners in HRBA

1. Monitoring implementation of the national action plans work

1. Measuring impact of HRBA on service delivery improvement e.g. improved access to FP by PWD or Sex workers or improved scores on client feedback etc. – Consideration for Implementation Research?

1. Support to more countries to conduct in-country HRBA assessments and systems strengthening in HRBA (Capacity building, integration in policies, strategies, training manuals, SOPs etc.)

Now more than ever, we need concrete ways to further a human rightsbased approach to family planning

Disruptions in foreign aid and growing anti-rights movement globally means centering human rights-based approaches to FP is critical to maintaining and advancing progress moving forward

Setting the Context for the Asia and Pacific Region: Low Fertility & HRBA Imperatives

 Over 50% of countries in Asia-Pacific now face below-replacement fertility. Policy responses must uphold reproductive rights—not promote coercion or pronatalism

 Human rights-based FP ensures informed choice, access, and bodily autonomy regardless of fertility trends

 Growing inequalities in access among marginalized populations (adolescents, migrants, indigenous groups)



Successes and Challenges in the AP Region

Successes and Emerging Good Practices

- Integration of HRBA into national FP policies in countries like Nepal, Philippines, and Indonesia
- Task-shifting and community engagement to expand equitable access
- Strengthening accountability mechanisms and legal protections for SRHR.

Ongoing Challenges

- Coercive practices in some settings (e.g. targets, incentives)
- Stigma and discrimination limiting access for unmarried youth and LGBTQI+ communities
- Underfunding of rights-based service delivery and data systems
- Need for capacity-building on HRBA across sectors and levels of government.

- Finding ways to engage donors and decision makers in different ways throughout the conference
- Including advocacy and accountability in various conference sessions.
- Leading roundtable discussions and exchanges on topics related to advocacy and accountability

Equity Through Action: Advancing Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights for All



Advocacy & Accountability: Workstreams



- Accountability: Planning post conference accountability session on 'SRHR/Family Planning Accountability in the wake of financing disruption
- LIVE Stage: incorporate advocacy and accountability topics on the LIVE Stage and encourage relevant individuals/groups to submit abstracts.



Advocacy & Accountability: Workstreams, continued



- Donors and decision-makers: Activities include Donor Mapping and Participation Planning, a donor panel, and Lunch with Leaders event to foster connections.
- **Skills-building:** Will design and facilitate a SMART Advocacy Training during Youth Summit
- Conference sessions: Two Lunch & Learn Table sessions:
 - One led by regional networks of trans people, people with disabilities, and sex workers, in coordination with the Power Shifting, Research, and Implementation subcommittees.
 - One focused on exchanges with decision-makers, to be mapped together with the Donor Engagement Workstream.



Engaging with Youth Leaders



- Youth are a driving force behind ICFP, with many sponsored opportunities to engage with ICFP and present research for youth.
- Prior to ICFP, the Gates Institute, in partnership with ICFP, will train 20 youth leaders in the Global Health Leadership and Advocacy Accelerator (GHLAA) curriculum and give them sponsorship to attend ICFP, where they will refine their advocacy innovations for their local contexts.



Human Rights & Advocacy work; People-Powered Inclusive Democracy



- Community Assemblies; Inclusion NOT participation. Using community assemblies, we are building 'trust' between governments and citizens and ensure government's decisions are respecting the participants inputs
- Jasiri Youth Champions In its 6th Cohort, the program targets Internally Displaced Persons, Women and Youth, bringing them to the decision-making spaces.




